Southeastern Region On The Verge of Reaching 1,000 Financial Members

The September 2011 International Membership Report shows the Southeastern Region having 902 financial members. The Regional Board anticipates that—through the hard work of our chapters in the areas of recruitment, retention, and reactivation—the regional membership should surpass the 1,000 milestone by the end of the year.

The International Reactivation Month Campaign will be conducted during the month of November. During this time, alumni members who were inactive three years or more can reactivate for 2012 at a rate of \$170. Also, 2009 and 2010 graduates can transfer into an alumni chapter at a rate of \$90. Both rates cover international and regional dues for 2012. Finally, military brothers who are currently in combat zones can renew their membership at no cost.

PARLAIMENTARIAN'S CORNER

Let's Debate the Issue

In the world of parliamentary procedures, debate is a critical part of the decision making process. Such a conversation should focus on the discussion of the merits of the question before the body. Properly executed debate will leave members of the body with a clear indication as to whether the issue on the floor should or should not be agreed to by the members present. The amount of debate typically allowed on any given motion depends on such things as the importance of the issue and the level of contention the issue is causing. Inherent in the debate process is always the right of every person in attendance to be heard on every single motion before it is acted upon. Efforts to limit debate on motions are not allowed except where permitted by parliamentary rule or through a two-thirds vote of the body. In the absence of a rule governing the length of speeches, a member who has gained the floor may speak no longer than ten minutes without the consent of the assembly, or by way of a *Motion to Extend Debate*, which also requires a two-thirds vote. When a speaker's time has been used, the chair is within his rights to interrupt him if he fails to relinquish the floor after an appropriate signal noting the exhaustion of his given time. However, if he is in the process of concluding his statements, the chair can afford him another minute to finish his statement.

Except the organization has a special rule to the contrary, speakers are not permitted to yield unused time to another member, nor is he allowed to hold any unused time in reserve to be used later in the debate. Any time a speaker yields the floor prior to the completion of his allotted time; the unused time is considered to have been waived. Likewise, if during the debate the speaker yields the floor to another member for the purpose of asking a question, that portion of time consumed by the question is deducted from the speaker's allotted time. Established parliamentary procedures require that each member is only allowed to speak no more than twice to the same issue on the same day, except when the issue is an appeal. During an appeal only the chair is allowed to speak twice, while all other members are limited to speaking only once.

The rules which govern debate limits may be modified so as to suit the needs of the body in the following ways:

- •Adoption of a special rule to make the two ten-minute speeches per member rule can be increased or reduced for all future meetings. The special rule adoption requires a two-third vote of the body subsequent to notice of the impending change.
- •Making a change in the limits for a single meeting of the body. Such a change can be made at any session by way of a main motion that is adopted by two-thirds of the body, and the change does not require prior notice of the vote.

Limits may be established which can reduce or increase the number and length of time that members may speak to pending questions only. The change may be affected only by two-thirds vote on a subsidiary motion to *Limit or Extend Limits of Debate*. Such a motion may also be used to end debate at a specific time in the future, or to end debate immediately through the call for *Previous Question* provided the vote is passed by a two-thirds margin.


Charlotte Alumni Chapter Announces New President

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Greenville Alumni Chapter, Alpha Lambda Sigma, Bro Rev Dr. John H Corbitt, retired from Springfield Baptist Church after 37years of service.

GREENVILLE, S.C. -- Dr. John H. Corbitt, civil rights leader and pastor of Springfield Baptist Church for 37 years, retired Sunday.

His church held a special service at 4 p.m. to recognize his ministry.

"Well, I hope it means that I did a fairly good job over 37 years and had some impact on somebody," Corbitt said.

Friends and members of his church were effusive in their praise of his leadership over the years.

"Without him, we couldn't have continued the legacy of Springfield Baptist Church," said Xanthene Norris, a Greenville County councilmember.

The church was founded in 1897 by former slaves, and became the first largely African American church in Greenville.

It became a headquarters for the civil rights movement in Greenville during the 1960s, and was the place where the Greenville branch of the NAACP and the Greenville Urban League were founded.

In 1972, the original church building burned down. Corbitt took over as pastor in 1974. "When we came to Greenville, we were having church over at Beck Middle School," he said.

Corbitt oversaw the building of a new building on East McBee Ave. in 1976.

At his retirement service, many local pastors came to talk about Corbitt's leadership. "Not only did he encourage people to stand up for their rights, he was a leader in that he participated himself in those type of movements," said Windell Rodgers, pastor of Greater Mount Calvary Baptist Church. "(He) set himself out as a a young student, a young seminarian, and a young pastor, encouraging others that God has granted us all the same rights and freedom of life."

"When you're talking about spiritual impact as well as social and moral (impact), he's been a giant among men in serving in the capacity that he has," said Carlton Austin of the Greenville Baptist Ministers Fellowship.

Corbett said he did not have any plans for what he would do during retirement, but said "maybe God will give me another assignment

Brotherhood Profile



Bro. William Evans

William Evans' paternal grandmother taught elementary school for 36 years, and nine of her 10 siblings went into education.

Even though that impressed him, a career within education was not his first thought when considering college.

"Chemistry was my favorite subject in high school. Originally, my plan was to go to pharmacy school," Evans says. "I was looking for universities that had that program. UNC was my first choice already because of the size of the University and the opportunities and diversity on campus. I was awarded the Pogue Scholarship, decided to attend UNC and never looked back."

In his first year at Carolina, Evans became involved with the Minority Student Recruitment Committee and found that he enjoyed recruiting students to attend the University and, more specifically, that he enjoyed working with young people. Going into his sophomore year, he changed his major to secondary education. He performed his student teaching at Jordan High School in Durham and loved the experience but found the most fulfillment in helping students with the college application process.

"That led me to want to be a counselor," Evans says. "It was rewarding because I was helping students determine their futures. With teaching, you are helping them learn material – which is certainly excellent and important. Being a counselor is helping them recognize their individual goals and plan for their futures. That process of putting together that puzzle was something I enjoyed doing."

Evans entered the School of Education's school counseling master's program right after his graduation. As a part of the program, he served an internship at East Chapel Hill High School, which led to a full-time counseling position after he received his master of arts degree.

He remained at East Chapel Hill for 10 years and pursued his school administration licensure from North Carolina Central University. An internship at Durham Technical Community College's Middle College High School led to his current position as dean of students at the high school, where students have the opportunity to complete their high school diplomas and take college classes at Durham Technical Community College at the same time. He credits several factors – including his mother, who raised him, and his graduate education at Carolina – for enabling him to be in a position where he can introduce young people to opportunities they may not have thought possible for them. "My graduate degree from UNC has enabled me to inspire and protect hundreds, if not thousands, of teenagers," he says. "As a high school counselor/dean, I have been in a position to encourage and usher students toward a college education who otherwise did not believe in themselves or think that it was possible. ... Without my graduate degree from UNC, I would not be in a position to do these things."

Eta Sigma Supports Annual Prostate Screening

On a still dark and rainy Saturday morning before most of the City of Raleigh had rustled awake, the men of the Eta Sigma Alumni Chapter of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Incorporated, were gathering at the Rex Senior Healthcare Center at 512 East Davie Street to assist with the annual Prostate Screening. The brothers of Eta Sigma have been involved with the annual event since its inception and they always look forward to being an integral part of the event's volunteer corps. Even though community service is expected of every good Sigma man, the annual Prostate Screening event is a cause that resonates with every member because of their recognition that African-American men are at the greatest risk of developing prostate cancer. Prostate cancer is the most common cancer found in African American Men and is the second leading cause of cancer related death in African American men.

It is because of the history of this disease that President Mose Dorsey and the Executive Committee ensured that the September 24th volunteer effort was enthusiastically recommended to the membership as a cause to support for the 2011-2012 program year. Without the need for further prompting the brotherhood immediately endorsed and committed to being volunteers and advocates for this annual event. By the end of the morning, the preliminary numbers indicated that 137 men were screened.

The local men of Sigma have readily embraced the importance of screening, early detection and treatment of prostate cancer in order to impact the devastating effects of this disease. The annual prostate screening is consistent with the Fraternity's International Living Well Brother-to-Brother initiative that is designed to educate and inform the community about key health issues facing men of color.

Brotherhood Profile Bro. Tyquan Ward, Gamma Gamma Chapter

"Helping someone out is how I extend my services; to help mankind. True community service requires a genuine heart. It may be small to you, but major to the person receiving. Small things add up, and I like helping people, and this my friend is why I am blessed." - Tyquan Ward

Sometimes you must be the one to spark the change you want to see in the world; you could see the sparks of Ward. Facing many trials and tribulations, North Carolina Central University's Tyquan Ward has exceeded all odds. Receiving good fortune, diverse in great quantity, in the eyes of many Ward has become the quintessential ideal student and person. By the age of 20, Ward has achieved becoming a Chancellor and Centennial Scholar, is an active member of NCCU's Gamma Gamma Chapter of Phi Beta Sigma Incorporation, President of SAAB (Student African American Brotherhood), and is expected to graduate with a degree in History May of 2013. Anything you can think of, "Ward did it."

After all of the applause and recognition, Ward does not end his day indulging in his achievements, but in his testimony of his journey, and the man it has made him to be. Destined to provide "Truth and service," Ward was born on April 25, 1991 in Brooklyn, New York, growing up in Brownsville Brooklyn, later moving to South Jamaica, Queens. Acknowledging the harsh realities that were faced growing up in an inner-city community, Ward imagined better days. Spending most of his time in Brownsville, Ward was immersed in crime, poverty and destruction, which inspired his migration to the south to receive a better education. Upon his arrival to NCCU, he pursued a Physics degree which soon became suppressed, developing thoughts of becoming a Gym teacher. Remembering his past, Ward could not visualize his impact. On the break of financial hardships, Ward was almost forced to sit out of school but with the help of family and educators, he received an epiphany and a second chance. Taking an intro history course, Ward was quickly enlightened through his professor Dr. Carlton Wilson, and the remembrance of watching the History channel as a kid. It was not until then Ward realized his passion for history and his dreams of pursuing a law degree with a concentration on Juvenile justice. During the summer of 2011, rewarded a trip to Ghana, Africa, Ward provided community service and further his education studying aboard. Leaving no room for rest, he returned to his humble beginnings of the streets of New York, raising money for the "Feed the Children" foundation. Standing in the weltering hot sun, five days a week, eight hours a day, Ward faced the challenge of pursuing people for donations. While many assisted, Ward faced comments such as "Let them die," lighting fuel to his fire to become a better person. Apart from "Feed the Children," walking for the "March of Dimes" and the Bone Marrow drive, Ward continues to extend his face in helping others with taking part in "Make a difference day" at NCCU, with his line brothers and the university on September 17th, 2011. This event wills also which will also consist of community service events.

"The only time one should look down on someone else is when they are helping someone up." Ward is a firm believer in change and the positive that this generation will make a change. After college Ward's future goals consist of teaching high school history before Law school, helping students to fill in the missing pieces of their past, providing hope and success for their future. "If you begin discipline in the high chair, you will not have to do it in the eclectic chair" said Ward. "Culture and service is what I abide by."

Delta Alpha Chapter Celebrates 15 Years of Sleep-Out For The Homeless Service Project in Winston-Salem



2011 marks the fifteenth anniversary of the Sleep-Out For The Homeless Campaign for the Delta Alpha chapter, Winston-Salem, NC. On Friday, November 22, 1996, the chapter introduced this significant program as part of its Social Action program

Since its reintroduction, the Sleep-Out has raised approximately \$2,000 cash and collected approximately 4,400 pounds of non-perishable food items and 205 boxes of clothing for the Winston-Salem community.

More than a one-night event, the Sleep-Out now is conducted in conjunction with the National Student Campaign against Hunger and Homelessness and the National Coalition for the Homeless. During the week, events are geared toward awareness and service culminating with the Annual Sleep-Out event. Each week before Thanksgiving, Phi Beta Sigma sponsors their version of the National Hunger and Homeless Week. This is a national event promoting education, action and awareness about hunger and homelessness.

This year, to commemorate the 15th anniversary, the chapter members have committed to raising \$1,500 for the Samaritan Ministries Annual Penny Campaign and collecting 1,500 pounds of food for the Second Harvest Food Bank of Northwest North Carolina. The brothers request that the chapters and brothers in the Southeastern Region support this outstanding effort by donating \$15.00 for this year's commemorative Sleep-Out.
